



A web-based learning resource providing a comprehensive knowledge base for Sexual Health and HIV



eHIV-STI is an extensive e-learning tool developed by the British Association for Sexual Health and HIV (BASHH) in collaboration with the Federation of the Royal Colleges of Physicians and the e-Learning for Healthcare programme. It was completed in December 2011.



Written by subject-matter specialists, and subject to extensive peer review, each session is around 20 minutes in length. Sessions incorporate video clips, case studies and an extensive picture library, supported by self-assessment tools. The learning management system enables the user to generate reports on personal usage of the material, and certificates of completion of individual sessions.

eHIV-STI reflects the UK Sexual Health and HIV specialist medical training curriculum, covering the knowledge required to CCT in Genito-urinary medicine. It can therefore act as a refresher for established consultants and career grade staff, and has been approved by the RCP for external CPD to support revalidation.

e-HIV-STI is also relevant for clinicians in related specialties such as dermatology, infectious diseases and gynaecology, as well as those in primary care wanting to increase their knowledge in the area of sexual health and HIV.

The project contains a significant public health component, which can be used as part of wider programmes of action to tackle public health problems and health inequality issues related to sexually transmitted infections, including HIV.

Modules include:

- Approach to the patient
- Pathology
- Bacterial STIs and related conditions
- Genital ulcer disease
- HPV infection
- Genital infestations
- Viral hepatitis
- Sexual assault / Abuse and medicolegal issues
- Pregnancy and children
- HIV special circumstances
- Vaginal discharge, vulvitis and balanitis
- HIV testing and prophylaxis
- Specific assessment and management of HIV
- Assessment and management of opportunistic HIV infections
- System specific HIV-associated conditions
- HIV associated malignancies
- Public health
- Gynaecology for GUM
